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ATTACHMENT “A”

MATERIALS ALLOWABLE AND PROHIBITED FOR DISPOSAL IN A (NONCOMMERCIAL) CLASS D SOLID WASTE FACILITY

Allowable Materials:

Asphaltic Substances, including bituminous concrete (Black Top)*;
Blocks, as masonry products *;
Bricks, as masonry products *;
Brush, encountered during site development within the disposal area;
Engineered Wood Products, such as OSB, plywood, particle board produced
as the result of construction, remodeling, repair, renovation, or demolition;
Grubbing Waste encountered in site development within the disposal area;
Hardened Construction Materials in containers such as: paint, lacquers, concrete,
caulking, resins, sealants, or adhesives;
Hardened Concrete*;
Lead-Based Paint, allowed only if attached to a painted surface;
Metals, including all metal piping, wiring and other metals too small or not practical to
be removed during demolition and remodeling activities;
Other Masonry Materials*;
Packaging, such as tape, backing, etc., if physically attached to materials, resulting
from construction, remodeling, renovation, repair and demolition operations on
houses, commercial and industrial buildings;
Plaster, including “dry wall”, wallboard, gypsum and similar products not containing
asbestos in a concentration equal to or greater than 1%;
Trees, encountered during site development within the disposal area;
Waste (excess) building and construction materials, unless explicitly prohibited*; and,
Wood, including wood panels, hardwood floors, etc., encountered in construction,
remodeling, repair, renovation, or demolition.

* Exempt except when mixed with other construction, remodeling, renovation, repair or
demolition debris.

**Note: Materials containing 1% or less asbestos are not subject to regulation
and are allowable.**

**Materials Allowable and Prohibited For Disposal
in a (Noncommercial) Class D Solid Waste Facility
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Prohibited Materials:

Aerosols;
Appliances;
Asbestos-Containing Waste Materials (ACWM's);
Automobile Shredder Fluff;
Ballasts;
Batteries;
Burnt Debris;
Capacitors;
Carpet and other Synthetic Floor Covering;
Cement;
Computers and Computer Equipment, as E-Wastes;
Contaminated Solid Waste;
Electrical Wastes, including batteries, mercury-containing switches, transformers and capacitors, and fluorescent tubes;
Free Liquids of any kind; including solvents, lubricating oil, brake fluid, cement slurry; any automotive fluids or fuels, adhesives, caulking, lacquers, paint, and sealants;
Household Furnishings or Household Wastes;
Industrial Wastes;
Lead;
Lead Flashing;
Liquid Paint, including lead-based paint;
Mercury-Containing Switches;
Metal Wastes, including metal piping, wiring, or similar wastes easily removed in demolition, or excess materials generated in construction or remodeling;
Oil Filters;
Pesticides;
Pressure Treated Wood;
Pressure Treated Wood or Lumber containing creosote or other preservatives;
Putrescible Wastes;
Railroad Ties;
Resin Containers;
Sludge Wastes;
Waste Tires;
White Goods; and,
Yard Wastes, except as encountered in site construction.

Note: This list is not final and may be revised based on evidence of groundwater contamination from other materials or other environmental concerns as may be applicable.
